DISTRICT GOVERNOR REPORT

The Year That Was



It is with much pleasure that I provide my report for the year 2022/23.

IMAGINE Rotary was the theme RI President Jennifer Jones announced as the global theme and I would like to think we did a fair amount of IMAGINING AND DOING in the year just gone.

As Jennifer said – "YOU DON'T IMAGINE YESTERDAY, YOU IMAGINE TOMORROW".

At the outset coming into this role in July 2022 I felt that COVID was behind us and we had the opportunity to reset our clubs' destinies such that our members could get back to doing what they do so well - 'Service'.

At the same time, I revived the Three Tenets from PDG Ross Carlyle's year – Welcome, Respected and Valued, reminding us all that membership retention was paramount as we regrouped. However, I added to those and made it the Six Tenets, including the vision of RI President Jennifer - Diversity Equity and Inclusion. The latter is a journey but one that allows current and new members, plus those considering joining our wonderful organisation, to understand Rotary doors are open to one and all.

My goals and aspirations for the district were:

- Membership Growth Three new Satellite clubs
- Younger Generations interface Three new Interact clubs.
- Club Interface supporting each other through working on joint projects.
- Rotaract closer alignment with Rotary and Rotaract

To summarise those, we had some wins and a few losses. Granted we did not get any Satellite clubs up however, I believe we have sown the seeds to embrace alternative ways to grow membership into the future.

On adjusted figures post July, we welcomed 77 new members, however we saw 108 members leave for a variety of reasons.

Reflecting for a moment the loss of a small number of Rotarians called to 'Higher Service'. We remember those for their valued 'service above self'.

I am forever hopeful that we will regain and build upon our lower membership numbers than seen over the past few years.

I am greatly appreciative of the untiring efforts of the West Tamar and Sandy Bay clubs for each chartering a new INTERACT club and excited that we should see at least one more club prior to the end of 2023. Youth and a younger membership pathway is our long-term future.

I also had a goal of encouraging clubs to have closer relationships with Rotaract clubs across the State. Part of this strategy was to add a district position of Rotaract Director and PP Jodie Lowe accepted this role. It behoves all clubs to encourage those we know in the 18 to 30 age demographic to look closely at joining Rotaract. Just another younger generation pathway to Rotary.

It was pleasing to recognise the RC of Burnie's efforts receiving a Global Grant for support of the Plumtree Hospital refurbishment of medical and IT equipment in Zimbabwe.



District also contributed financially to support the installation of a shallow bore water system through the RC Surulere South in Lagos, Nigeria from discretionary District Grant funds.

1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared for use by the District Leaders Group (DLG) and the Members. The DLG has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

The financial report is prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The DLG has decided that the excess of income over expenses each year may be transferred into provisions for specific provisions detailed in note 3.

The financial statements have been produced using Xero. Xero does not facilitate converting numbers to whole numbers. Therefore, some of the additions in the financial statements can be impacted by rounding.

Independent Auditor's Report to the Members of

Rotary International District 9830 Inc.

Qualified Audit Opinion

We have audited the financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of the Rotary International District 9830 Inc. (the Association), which comprises the balance sheet as at 30 June 2023 and the income and expenditure statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial report of the matter referred to in the basis for qualified opinion' paragraph, the accompanying financial report of the Association presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Association as at 30 June 2023, and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards to the extent described in Note 1.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

It is not practical for the Association to establish complete accounting control over all fundraising activities and accordingly, for those fundraising activities audit procedures do not extend beyond the amounts of such fundraising income recorded in the accounting records of the Association.

We conducted our audit in accordance with *Australian Auditing Standards* and the *Associations Incorporation Act 1964*. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and those Charged with Governance for the Financial Report

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Liability limited by a scheme approved under Professional Standards Legislation.

In preparing the financial report, management is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Association's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether
 due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks,
 and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our
 opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher
 than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional
 omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of
 expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
