R. Gordon R. McInally was educated at the Royal High School in Edinburgh and at the University of Dundee, where he earned his graduate degree in dental surgery. He operated his own dental practice in Edinburgh until 2016. Gordon was chair of the East of Scotland branch of the British Pedodontics Society and has held various academic positions. He has also served as a presbytery elder, chair of the Queensferry parish congregational board, and commissioner to the general assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Gordon joined Rotary in 1984 at age 26. A member of the Rotary Club of South Queensferry, he has served as president and vice president of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland (RIBI). He has also served RI as a director and on several committees, including as an adviser to the 2022 Houston Convention Committee and chair of the Operations

Gordon looks forward to working with members to build new Rotary clubs and groups. "My vision is that Rotary should exist everywhere in a style to suit everyone who has the desire to be part of us and to help us do good in the world,"

Gordon is a patron of the UK-based non-profit Hope and Homes for Children and led a partnership between that organization and RIBI to support children in Rwanda who had been orphaned in the genocide there. He is a patron of Trade-Aid, an initiative of the Rotary Club of Grantham Kesteven, Lincolnshire, England, that provides sustainable humanitarian aid to individuals, families, and businesses in the developing world. He is also an ambassador for Bipolar UK, a national mental health organization.

In his free time, Gordon enjoys rugby, good food and wine, and stick dressing, the traditional Scottish craft of making walking sticks.

Gordon describes The Rotary Foundation as "the fuel that provides the energy to do Rotary service." He and his spouse, Heather, also a Rotarian, are Paul Harris Fellows, Major Donors, and Benefactors of The Rotary Foundation. They are also members of the Bequest Society, Gordon wishes to dedicate his presidency to making the world a better place for his granddaughters, Ivy and Florence, to live and thrive.

Michael (Mike) and Margot have lived in Lindisfarne for the last 30 years and are both members of the Rotary Club of Lindisfarne. They met while still at school and have been married for 49 years.

They have two adult sons and six grandchildren, all living in Tasmania. After graduating from Tas Uni, both were employed by the Department of Education, and they lived and worked in Schools and Libraries in many locations around Tasmania and Overseas before settling in Lindisfarne.



Mike is the son of a charter member of the Rotary Club of Glenorchy and his Rotary journey started in 1971 when he attended RYLA. He joined the Rotary Club of Oatlands in 1992, Moonah in 1993 where he was President in 1997-98 and Lindisfarne in 2000 where he was President in 2006-07 and again in 2019-20 and 2020-21. He was awarded a Paul Harris Fellow in 2010. Margot joined the Rotary Club of Lindisfarne in 2006, was President in 2010-11 and was awarded a PHF in 2013.

Margot was Charter President of the Innerwheel Club of Clarence in 2007-08 and was again President in 2018-19. She was Innerwheel District Chairman 2021-22.

Both Mike and Margot have been involved in many Rotary projects. They have hosted five overseas exchange students and both sons did Youth Exchange with RC Hobart. (Matthew Finland 2000 and Andrew Austria 2003) As inaugural Secretary, Margot assisted in the establishment of Rotary Youth Driver Awareness in Tasmania, and they worked together for nearly 10 years on the Rotary Australia Repurposing Equipment committee. Mike has been a long-time presenter at RYDA, RYPEN and the (RLI) Building Future Leaders Program and was a long-term member of the District Membership Committee. He was Assistant Governor Group 1 2015/16 and 2016/17 and District Trainer 2017/18, 2021/22 and 2022/23.

As we celebrated 100 years of Rotary in Tasmania, Mike is focused on ensuring Rotary adjusts to meet the needs of a changing world. Clubs and the District need to be fun and inclusive. They need quality projects to motivate new and existing members and they need to look for opportunities to start new Clubs. Mike will promote Rotarians as 'People of Action' and will work hard to support Clubs in their endeavours. Mike is looking forward to his project to increase awareness of Domestic Violence in the community and Margot is keen for her project to assist Clubs to conserve their Club histories.

Outside of Rotary, Mike has had a lifetime involvement in Scouts and was a Queen Scout in 1971. He has been a Scout, Venturer and Rover Leader for 41 years and was Chief Commissioner of Scouting in Tasmania 2010-16. He has a Silver Kangaroo Award and is a Life Member of the Tasmanian Branch. Mike was 2005 Australia Day Citizen of the Year, City of Clarence, for service to the residents of Clarence. In their spare time Mike and Margot have tried their hand at house renovation. They enjoy traveling, camping and 4WDing and spending time at their holiday place on the East Coast.





ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT


As a Rotarian, I will:

In 2023-24, Gordon will encourage clubs and districts to undertake activities that:

- Erase any stigma associated with discussions of emotional well-being.
- Raise awareness of mental health needs
- Improve access to mental health services.

2. Building Peace Through Virtual Exchanges:

Rotary has a long history of working for peace through personal connections, but the COVID-19 pandemic has made it difficult to do that face-to-face. Inspired by what we've learned during this time, Gordon will encourage districts to incorporate virtual components into more of their programs, events, and activities. By using innovative technologies to make connections, we give more people the opportunity to experience our global community.

Adding or maintaining these components in Rotary Youth Exchanges, New Generations Service Exchanges, Rotary Friendship Exchanges, and other programs in 2023-24 will:

- Give members and participants new ways to experience other cultures, make new friends, and broaden their global awareness.
- Make membership more accessible to people with time, health, or financial considerations.
- Build stronger intercultural communication and understanding, and ultimately foster more stable and peaceful communities.

3. Empowering Girls:

Gordon will continue the initiative launched by 2021-22 RI President Shekhar Mehta and maintained by 2022-23 RI President Jennifer Jones that focused on empowering girls and women around the world. We encourage members to keep finding ways to improve the health, well-being, education, and economic security of girls.

Club office bearers must be registered to fulfill their roles as well as access official Rotary material and training documents.

Signing in to "My Rotary" gives all members access to a wealth of information about the great organisation that Rotary is. There is a plethora of information and an excellent Learning Centre that not only provides courses on Club and District roles but also self-development courses.

Any club member can create an account after which signing in is a simple task.

To register:

- Go to rotary.org/myrotary
- Click on the 'sign in/register' button, followed by the 'create account' button.
- Enter your first name, last name, and your email address (as reported/used in the RI database)
- Answer the question/s
- Click on the link in the email that will be sent to you to activate your account.
- Choose your own password and secret question.

Once registered, you can change your login email and password if and when you choose.

My Rotary enables club officers to:

- View and change club membership data
- Pay club dues.
- Search club and district data
- Input Club Annual Goals
- Update club data including service hours and goals progress.
- View reports for example, The Rotary Foundation contributions.

COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION & COUNCIL ON RESOLUTIONS:

The Council on Legislation is the body assembled on behalf of Rotary International to review and vote on proposed changes to the legislation that governs Rotary. They consider enactments, which change Rotary's governing documents and position statements by the RI Board.

The Council on Resolutions meets online every year to vote on proposed resolutions. Resolutions are requests to the Board or the Trustees to take an action that is outside the purview of the constitutional documents. Ideally, a resolution should affect the Rotary world, rather than address local or administrative issues.

Each Rotary district chooses a representative for a three-year term. These members represent their districts at all three meetings of the Council on Resolutions and at the Council on Legislation during their term.

PROTOCOLS AND RESOLUTIONS:

This committee provides assistance and advice with protocols and assists the District Governor to prepare resolutions for the District Conference and the District AGM.

PROTECTION OFFICER:

The District Protection Officer's role includes the following:

- Monitor changes in national and local laws related to youth protection, as well as any changes in RI
 policies, and relate them to the governor and district program chairs.
- Work with the district and clubs to inform all Rotarians of their youth protection obligations.
- Confirm that appropriate screening measures are conducted for all youth programs, in compliance with Rotary policies and local laws.
- Direct the selection of Rotarian and non-Rotarian volunteers and ensure that volunteer screening is documented appropriately.
- Ensure that appropriate training is provided to Rotarians, other volunteers and youth program

participants and their parents.

- Oversee proper handling of allegations and protect the interests of all who are involved.
- Maintain records of all allegations of abuse, harassment, or other crises.
- Keep records for the District Governor for those members with a WWVP card and Volunteer Declaration (Form 3).

LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT

DISTRICT LEARNING &

DEVELOPMENT CO-ORD.: C Ross Carlyle Sandy Bay

The District Learning and Development Coordinator's role is to assist the District Governor Elect to prepare Presidents Elect and their Boards prior to their year through an annual calendar of learning and development events including District Leadership Team (**DLT**) training, Presidents Elect Training Seminars (**PETS**) and District Training Assembly (**DTA**). Also, the role includes continuing to build the cadre of future leaders through Rotary Leadership Institute (**RLI**) / Building Future Leader Seminars.

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PRESIDENT ELECT TRAINING SEMINAR (PETS):

The purpose of the President Elect Training Seminar is to provide club presidents with the current and necessary skills, knowledge and motivation to lead an effective club. All Presidents Elect are required by RI to attend PETS prior to becoming a Club President. Presidents Nominee and Secretaries Elect are also welcome to attend. PETS is usually held in March each year.

DISTRICT TRAINING ASSEMBLY (DTA):

The District Training Assembly offers the opportunity for club officers, committee chairs and assistant governors to learn about their roles, further develop leadership skills and refine strategies to achieve their goals. All Rotarians who accept key club leadership roles are encouraged to attend the District Training Assembly. Training assemblies like this are the best way to help your club be even more successful. Participants will discover tips to assist with the continual improvement of clubs and districts. Attendees should include all of the incoming Club Board. All Rotarians are welcome to attend. DTA is usually held in May each year.

BUILDING FUTURE LEADERS:

The mission of The Rotary Leadership Institute is to provide an educational opportunity for Rotarians. Rotary needs a constant influx of leaders as club officers, since they mostly change every year. It is often difficult at the club level to learn enough about the exciting world of Rotary, and it is also important to remember that leadership skills in volunteer organisations are often different from business leadership skills.

The Rotary Leadership Institute, through 'Building Future Leaders' can help with this. Attendance is open to all Rotarians and costs are covered by the Clubs.

The program is a combination of zoom meetings and a one-day face to face session. To earn the certificate, participants must complete all sessions, but it is possible to do them in any order. Participants who do not wish to earn the certificate can join the group for any part of the program.

MEMBERSHIP

The Director – Membership assists the district by

- Supporting existing clubs by promoting recruitment of new members and retention of existing members, through sharing information, arranging workshops and making Club visits.
- Investigating suitable locations for new clubs and or satellite clubs and assisting sponsor clubs in their support role.

Membership Happens at Club level and is the product of good management, good programs, good projects and happy Clubs.

Membership is everyone's business! Every Rotarian needs to ensure that Club members and new volunteers feel welcome, respected, and valued. We also need to ensure all members in our Rotary family feel the reward of their involvement in Rotary. Running friendly inclusive meetings, taking on meaningful projects, publicising our many successes and being seen in the community is how we attract new members. Successfully completing service projects, enjoying fellowship, and making new friends is how we retain members. Above all we need to ensure that the Rotary experience is fun.

District 9830 has the opportunity in 2023-24 to start several new clubs as well as grow the appeal of our existing Clubs. Two new clubs and two additional members in each existing club would go a long way to ensure the future of Rotary in Tasmania

When you consider membership of your Club, ask yourself questions like

- Does every visitor feel welcome?
- Are you inclusive with who you invite to meetings?
- What do you do to attract younger Rotarians?
- What family friendly events do you run?
- Are members enjoying the community service that club does?

MEMBERSHIP TYPES:

There are several new types of membership being supported by the district as outlined below.

To take advantage of any of these options, clubs may need to amend their Bylaws to accommodate accordingly.

CLUB MEMBER:

Rotary is an organisation with over 1.2 million+ members in over 35,000 clubs spread around the world.

- Club membership has been the key to Rotary's long-term success.
- Individuals are club members (with voting rights, registered in My Rotary)
- Rotary is organised around clubs, which are the building blocks of the organisation.
- Club members are 'People of Action'.

SATELLITE CLUB MEMBER:

Clubs are encouraged to sponsor a Satellite club. (Smaller groups: - Professional Development, Special Interest, Small Community, Start-up)

Satellite Clubs are an extension of the Sponsor Club, offering an alternative meeting style, time and place to the Sponsor Club. A member of a Satellite Club is a member of the Sponsor Club. The aim is for each Satellite Club to become a chartered Rotary Club. Satellite Clubs may suit groups of Rotarians with interests in a

particular cause. Satellite club members are all active club members with full rights and privileges of the parent club.

CORPORATE MEMBER:

Clubs may choose to admit corporate members.

This membership category allows an organisation or company in the club's area to become a member of the Rotary club, through an established membership approval process, and to appoint up to four designees as the individuals attending club meetings, serving on projects and so on.

- Designated person is the nominal club member (one person registered in My Rotary, one vote at district and international level)
- Up to three other nominated designees (registered in club records)
- Club determines whether designated person and/or nominated designees can hold office and have voting rights within the club.
- Name badges included.
- Designated person entitled to wear Rotary lapel pin.
- Club determines fee payable by corporate member and what that fee covers.
- Pay own way when attending club meetings and/or events.

eCLUB MEMBER:

eClubs are web-based Rotary clubs which are essentially like any other Rotary club.

Meeting online may better suit someone who has a busy schedule, limited mobility, or live in an area without a Rotary club. Clubs that meet online may arrange to meet in person for service projects, social activities or Rotary events. As an example, the Rotary Convention or District Conference.

Active club member with full rights and privileges

HONORARY MEMBER:

Clubs may choose to admit Honorary members.

Persons who have distinguished themselves by meritorious service in the furtherance of Rotary ideals and those persons considered friends of Rotary for their permanent support of Rotary's causes, and those past members a club may choose to honour, may be offered Honorary membership. Length of appointment is determined by the club board.

- Free club membership (no voting rights, not registered in My Rotary)
- Clubs may choose to provide a generic 'Honorary member' name badge. for use while an Honorary member
- Not entitled to wear Rotary lapel pin.
- Registered in My Rotary as 'Honorary member'
- Pay own way when attending club meetings and/or events.

FRIENDS OF ROTARY:

Some clubs welcome 'Friends of Rotary'.

'Friends of Rotary' is the vehicle clubs may use to record the extra help (human resources) they may need in order to provide and facilitate a service activity. An example is the Tasmanian Craft Fair where the RC Deloraine registers as 'Friends of Rotary' the many extra people who assist in the running of the fair.

- Registered in club records as 'Friend of Rotary'.
- No name badge.
- Not entitled to wear Rotary lapel pin.
- No Rotary recognition other than 'Friend of Rotary'
- Pay own way if attending event.

FAMILY MEMBER:

Clubs may choose to admit Family members.

Family members are individuals who are related to a club member, such as a spouse, partner, child or grandchild. Like Associate members, Family members become acquainted with the Rotary club, its members, its programs and projects assisting when and where they can.

- Payment of a nominal club fee but exempt from district and RI fees (no voting rights, not registered in My Rotary)
- Name badge included, e.g., Jane Smith, Family member.

- Not entitled to wear Rotary lapel pin.
- Registered in club records as a Family member.
- Pay own way when attending club meetings and/or events.

ASSOCIATE MEMBER:

Clubs may choose to admit Associate members.

This membership type allows an individual to become associated and acquainted with a Rotary club, its members, its programs and projects and the expectations of club membership with the intent of becoming an active member within a designated period of time.

- Associate member from starting time to the end of that particular Rotary year e.g. start as Associate member in April and end on 30 June
- No fees (no voting rights, not registered in My Rotary)
- Club supplies generic 'Associate member' name badge for use whilst an Associate member.
- Not entitled to wear Rotary lapel pin.
- Registered in club records as Associate member.
- Pay own way when attending club meetings and/or events.

CLUB SPONSORS

Another valuable asset for a club is to have a club sponsor, or several sponsors. Club sponsorship may be for those individuals or businesspeople with a social conscience, who cannot donate time, but will support a club and/or community related activities via a donation. This may be either cash or goods in lieu. The way a club chooses to recognise sponsor(s) is up to the club to decide. Suggestions for this include the following:

- Invite sponsor(s) to attend key club events as guests of the club.
- Recognise sponsor(s) by presenting a framed 'club sponsor' certificate.

The use of a sponsorship donation depends on its intended purpose:

- If given to the club for administrative or general use the club may decide to use it, for example, to
 offset membership fees.
- If given for a specific service project or cause, the donation must be channelled through the service activities accounts.

PUBLIC IMAGE

DIRECTOR: Roslyn Teirney North Hobart

The Director – Public Image manages the district public relations and communications activities and is available to assist clubs in developing publicity that both supports Rotary International's marketing themes and raises the profile of the Rotary brand within the district.

OUR BRAND:

The Masterbrand and Mark of Excellence replaced the Legacy Wheel in July 2013.

The Masterbrand signature is the common branding theme for all Rotary materials and has been the standard since 2013. It is to be used on all documents, brochures, pamphlets, banners, letterheads, clothing, websites, signage, marketing, etc. It's simple and conveys a common easily recognised identity for Rotary world-wide. The logos come in different sizes, formats and resolutions. There are several versions available from colour to B&W. They are customisable to include club name and clubs must only use the brand of their own club.

- Rotary International strongly discourages use of the Legacy Wheel
- The Masterbrand is the identifier that should be on all things 'Rotary'.
- The Mark of Excellence may be used as long as the Masterbrand appears also.
- Clubs must identify themselves when using the Masterbrand.

GUIDELINES ON USE OF THE ROTARY MARK

There are two components to the Brand.



1. MASTERBRAND: i.e. The word Rotary with Wheel on right

The Masterbrand Signature as it is shown below with the word Rotary and wheel can only be used by Rotary International in this format, not by clubs.

Rotary Clubs and Districts are required to use the Masterbrand by personalising it to their own Club or District at the Brand Centre on My Rotary.

MARK OF EXCELLENCE: i.e. The Rotary Wheel alone

The Mark of Excellence or wheel alone **should not** be used on its own. It can only be used when the Master Brand is somewhere in the document.



How to use the Rotary Marks

All clubs are encouraged to use the Rotary branding templates available on My Rotary. The golden rules are:

- 1. If you wish to use the Mark of Excellence, you must also have the Masterbrand. personalised to your club or district on the same page/screen/brochure, etc.
- 2. The Wheel cannot be used on its own without the Masterbrand.
- 3. You can use a Lock Up which is shown below for projects of the club or district.

We do this through providing surgical services to those who could not otherwise afford or access these and by building the capacity of local medical systems through our training and mentoring programs.

NEPAL PROJECTS;

Nepalese and Tasmanian Rotarians have worked together over several years to successfully implement a number of humanitarian projects to improve the lives and welfare of many needy local people in Nepal, particularly in the Districts of Makwanpur, Syangja, Rautahat and Bara and localities of Kathmandu, Hetauda and Waling.

Two currently joint projects with the RC of Hetauda include the "Gift of Sight" Eyecare program / Outreach MicroSurgical Eye Camps (OMEC) and the Hetauda Support Project.

The Gift of Sight project provides eye screening, diagnoses and treatment of eye issues in sight-impaired, remote-area Nepalese people. Many surgical corrections of cataracts are subsequently performed at the Hetauda Community Eye Hospital, including free accommodation, meals and transport for patients, thereby making a very positive impact on the lives of many families and the poorest people in a very poor country.

The Hetauda Support Project in various ways provides improvement in educational opportunities and health and living outcomes of the needy, including support for the Hetauda Blind School and provision of an ongoing music program for the students. Sponsorship and funding is currently mainly possible through generous giving by various individual Rotarians and some Rotary Clubs.

EMERGENCY FODDER RELIEF;

In disasters like the recent bushfires, one of the urgent needs is fodder for livestock. Rotary clubs, especially rural clubs, have the knowledge, skills and networks to be leading organisers in the collection, transport and distribution of fodder in future disasters. The Tasmanian Disaster Fodder Relief Plan has been accepted by the Tasmanian Government as the key distribution method in disasters. The fodder program focuses on providing assistance to farmers following floods, fires or disease outbreaks. The District has reserved \$20,000 so it can immediately respond with the purchase of fodder until donations start to flow.

DISTRICT RESOURCE NETWORK (DRN)/ DISTRICT INTERNATIONAL SERVICE CHAIR (DISC)

The District International Service Chair (DISC) is part of our Service Projects team. The DISC role includes developing a District Resources Network (DRN). A DRN includes: identified skilled resources, within our district who can work together as a Project Enhancement Team, supporting those who are assessing, planning,

funding, implementing and executing projects and finally reporting including to the Rotary Showcase. These teams can work across club, district and national boundaries to draw on wide pools of experience, expertise and contacts. Clubs can use the DRN via the DISC when planning new projects to draw on the experience of others who have managed or worked on similar types of projects. The DISC can also facilitate the identification of project partners – host Rotary clubs with committed Rotarians who will



see the project through to completion. This is a key step in developing new successful and sustainable international and community service projects.

Last year, PDG Bob Calvert started a Gynaecological Cancer Project which aimed to create awareness of and to raise funding for clinical trials undertaken by the Royal Hobart Cancer and Blood Services Clinical Trials Unit, to assist Tasmanian women suffering from a gynaecological cancer. These trials help to **create hope** - hope the participants will benefit from the trial and hope that, as a result of the trials, the disease will impact people less in the future.

Rotary Tasmania Community Care (RTCC) are championing this project. Clubs can help by raising awareness with guest speakers and/or community awareness events, as well as by selling merchandise or holding fundraising events.

DIRECTOR: C Ross CARLYLE Sandy Bay

The Rotary Foundation transforms your gifts into projects that change lives, both close to home and around the world. As the charitable arm of Rotary, it taps into a global network of Rotarians who invest their time, money and expertise into our priorities, such as eradicating polio and promoting peace.

Foundation grants empower Rotarians to approach challenges such as poverty, illiteracy and malnutrition with sustainable solutions that leave a lasting impact.

Strong financial oversight, a stellar charity rating and a unique funding model mean that we make the very most of your contributions. Give and become a part of Rotary's life-changing work.

The Director - The Rotary Foundation acts on behalf of the District Governor in supervising TRF committees as they work to engage clubs in TRF programs and encourage clubs to support TRF causes.

AREAS OF FOCUS:

The most successful and sustainable Rotary service projects involve:

- Peacebuilding and Conflict Prevention
- Disease Prevention and Treatment
- Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene
- Maternal and Child Health
- Basic Education and Literacy
- Community Economic Development
- Environment

As a service organisation, Rotary encourages the promotion of these causes as the basis of our community and fundraising activities - that is, we fundraise to serve a cause!

GRANTS:

Global Grants: support large international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes in Rotary's areas of focus. By working together to respond to real community needs, clubs and districts strengthen their global partnerships.

Read A Guide to Global Grants for detailed information on planning your project, applying for a grant to fund it, carrying it out, and reporting on your progress and outcome.

Global grants, which must support one or more areas of focus, can fund humanitarian projects, scholarships for graduate-level academic studies and vocational training teams.

The minimum budget for a global grant project is \$30,000. The Foundation's World Fund provides a minimum of \$15,000 and maximum of \$200,000. Clubs and districts contribute District Designated Funds (DDF) and/or cash contributions.



If considering applying for a Global Grant please seek advice first from any of the following: Director - TRF, DISC Chair, a TRF Cadre, Grants Chair.

<u>District Grants:</u> fund small-scale, short-term activities that address needs in your community and communities abroad. Each district chooses which activities it will fund with these grants providing they support the mission of The Rotary Foundation. Grants are funded up to a maximum of \$3,000 on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

PEACE FELLOWSHIPS:

Each year, Rotary selects up to 100 professionals from around the world to receive fellowships to study at one of our peace centres. Through academic training, practice and global networking opportunities, the Rotary Peace Centre's program develops leaders who become catalysts for peace and conflict prevention and resolution.

These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation and all internship and field-study expenses.

In just over a decade, the Rotary Peace Centres have trained more than 1,600 fellows for careers in peace building. Many of them are serving as leaders at international organizations or have started their own foundations.

VOCATIONAL PROJECTS

DIRECTOR: Bert Dorgelo Tasman Peninsula

The Director – Vocational Projects, via committees, assists the District Governor in promoting high ethical standards and fostering the ideal of service in all vocations. Vocational service values underpin much of what Rotarians do – promoting ethical practices in all vocations, recognising the value of all useful occupations and taking action by contributing their vocational talents to the problems and needs of society. Through vocational service we:

- Serve others by using our unique skills to address community needs.
- Empower others through training and skill development.
- Inspire others to act with integrity by following Rotary's guiding principles.

These values lie behind everything we do.

EMERGENCY AND DISASTER RECOVERY:

Rotary Clubs in Tasmania have proved to be essential agents in the recovery process following natural disasters that have improved outcomes for families and communities. Rotary is accepted as an ongoing support organisation and has a formal role in the State Recovery planning.

This action area has been placed within Vocational Projects as it is developmental and there is scope to add resilience and disaster thinking into mainstream business practice in a time of climate change and environmental threat.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT EXCHANGE (PDE):

The Professional Development Exchange program is a Rotary Tasmania initiative with an active professional/business development emphasis.

PDE is a unique professional and cultural exchange opportunity for businesspeople and professionals between the ages of 25 and 35, who are in the early stages of their careers.

Team members experience the host country's culture and institutions, observe how their vocations are practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships and exchange ideas. The team is led by an experienced Rotarian, selected from club nominations.

ROTARACT:

From a simple beginning in 1968, Rotaract has become a strong international service club for young men and women (aged 18+) who have a commitment to their communities, be it at local and/or international level.

Sponsored and supported by local Rotary clubs, members of Rotaract seek to develop friendships and professional contacts that will enable them to address the physical and social needs of their communities. At the same time, members develop their own personal skills and knowledge. As part of an international network of Rotaract clubs, members can reach well beyond the local scene through projects, contacts and conferences. The District Rotary Director and Rotaract Representative are available to help organise new Rotaract clubs, assist communication between Rotary and Rotaract and plans district- wide training for Rotaract club officers. Rotaract hold regular meetings to suit their programs and while the Rotaract charter requires a Rotary presence at each of these meetings, Rotaract is autonomous with its own Standard Club Constitution and it regulated through the Rotaract Statement of Policy.

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Rotaract Clubs are now members of Rotary International and they can also co-sponsor Interact Clubs.

Additionally, the District Governor is able to appoint Rotaract members in good standing to serve in any district committee role.

ROTARY FRIENDSHIP EXCHANGE/MISSIONS:

Friendship Exchange is an international exchange program that allows participants to take turns hosting one another in their homes and clubs.

There are many benefits:

- Broaden international understanding.
- Explore a specific profession or job in a different context.
- Build enduring friendships.
- Establish a foundation for peace and service.
- Gain opportunities for active project involvement and support
- Learn about a region's people, food, languages, customs and history

Friendship Exchange participants are Rotary members and friends. They travel as individuals, couples, families or groups. Prospective exchange teams communicate in advance to decide on the purpose, format, timing, logistics and duration of each visit.

Exchanges offer unique chances for cultural immersion and interchange. They may include opportunities for professionals, including young professionals, to build global understanding and boost vocational and leadership skills. They can provide cultural experiences, vocational activities, fellowship and much more.

All exchanges from Tasmania are funded by the participants. Hosts are not expected to assume a significant financial burden. Visitors enjoy warm hospitality and an international travel experience unlike any other. Hosts are rewarded with new friendships and cultural exchanges, while showing their part of the world to visitors.

ROTARY FELLOWSHIPS:

Rotary Fellowships are autonomous, international groups of Rotarians, Rotarian partners and Rotaractors who join together to:

- Share a common interest in worthwhile recreational activities (sports, hobbies, etc.)
- Further their vocational development through acquaintance with others of the same profession
- Make new friends around the world.
- Explore new opportunities for service.
- Have fun and enhance their Rotary experience!

Rotary Fellowships began informally in 1928 when Rotarians with a shared interest in the international language Esperanto joined together. In 1947, a group of Rotarian boating enthusiasts began flying the Rotary flag from their craft, calling themselves the International Yachting Fellowship of Rotarians – which now holds the distinction of being the oldest continuing fellowship. The scope of fellowships has changed significantly over the years, but their purpose remains the same: to unite Rotarians in friendship and provide opportunities to enjoy favourite recreational or professional activities.

Many fellowships also use their special interests to serve others. For example. Fellowship Canoeing Rotarians has clean-ups of polluted rivers; members of the International



Computer Users Fellowship of Rotarians conduct training sessions for Rotarians and others in their community and members of the International Fellowship of Rotarian Scuba Divers join local Rotary clubs to undertake service projects on each of their diving trips.

Rotary International has established specific policies for forming a Rotary Fellowship. The RI Board of Directors evaluates each prospective group before deciding whether to formally recognise it. However, each fellowship operates independently of RI, with its own rules, dues, requirements, and administrative structure.

Membership is open to all Rotarians, Rotarian partners and Rotaractors.

YOUTH PROJECTS

DIRECTOR: Liz BULMAN Youngtown

The Director – Youth Projects is responsible to the District Governor for planning, organising, assisting and supporting clubs in the implementation of programs that support the youth of our community, including building strong relationships with schools.

SCHOOL/CLUB RELATIONSHIPS;

The District and clubs have recently undertaken a review of which clubs support which school(s) and whilst it was recognised there are some cross overs, it was decided to develop an online database, accessible via the Rotary Tasmania secure Members Section, which identifies what clubs are doing what with what schools.

This data base will allow clubs to enter in which schools they are supporting and to what.

degree both financial and in kind.

The district asks clubs to support students from the schools primarily aligned to them, however through the database, work with other clubs to ensure schools and students are provided the best coverage possible.

- Clubs can enrol support from other club(s) as needed/requested, as some clubs may have had relationships in the past with schools they are not primarily aligned to.
- Some students may apply for a single program through several clubs, a drain on resources and time.
 The purpose of this database is to ensure we capture those students applying though their school to

the club aligned to their school, which is not necessarily the club nearest to where they may live.

- For some programs the relevant committee may work extremely hard to find and secure students for programs. The advantage of this database is that, in these cases, the committees will know which club(s) to approach to support these students.
- As always, the spirit of Rotary cooperation applies. If a club cannot or does not wish to support a
 student, or maybe several students apply from the one school (which could involve a large cost), then
 clearly another club or clubs may step up to help or be approached.

Clubs should be communicating with their aligned schools and building foundations for long term relationships and the ongoing success of our excellent Youth Programs.

ROTARY YOUTH PROGRAM of ENRICHMENT (RYPEN):

RYPEN holds weekend camps in leadership for Grade 10 students. It is an Australian designed project for young people aged 14 to 17. Camps are held in May in both the south and north of Tasmania.

RYPEN sets out to broaden horizons and lift aspirations in a supervised residential weekend seminar. Its aim is to communicate to young people a series of ideas, problems and social experiences, which will assist them in forming their own values and moral standards and broaden their horizons culturally, socially and academically.

Nominations are encouraged through Rotary clubs approaching their nominated schools.

Applications are directed to the district RYPEN chair for selection and advice. The cost for the weekend is usually carried by the sponsoring Rotary club.

RYPEN participants gain effective strategies to support their personal leadership goals, along with wonderful memories of their weekend and a great group of new friends.

ROTARY YOUTH DRIVER AWARENESS (RYDA):

RYDA is a community road safety initiative delivering practical road safety information. The program is facilitated in partnership with Rotary, presented by professionals and supported by corporate sponsors. The program about road safety is directed towards our young people as they approach the period in their life when they start driving a car and riding as a passenger in a car driven by one of their peers. In Tasmania it is presented to students in Grade 10.

The program focuses on attitude and awareness, with the aim of making the students better people on the road. ROTARY ADVENTURE IN CITIZENSHIP (RAIC):

Rotary Adventure in Citizenship (RAIC) is an intensive and fun-filled program to help prepare young adults for full participation as citizens of Australia.

Each year in May around 35 Year 11 students (the delegates) are sent by their local Rotary clubs to Canberra. For a week, RAIC puts the delegates "inside" Canberra. The delegates are immersed behind the scenes in Parliament House. They are taken out of their comfort zones into new places, set amongst new faces and asked to do new things.

Delegates view parliament in action, including the budget speech and question time, meet their federal members of parliament and press gallery journalists. Through role play, they participate in law-making debates and explore the functions of the parliament. One of the highlights is having morning tea with the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Most importantly, they meet and make friends with young people from all over Australia. Delegates from previous years have said this is one of the highlights of the RAIC program. The program is run in partnership with the Parliamentary Education Office.

WINDEWARD BOUND YOUTH LEADERSHIP CHALLENGE:

The brigantine "Windeward Bound" is a 33-metre-tall ship. The Windeward Bound Trust's Annual Youth Leadership Challenge is a working partnership with Rotary Tasmania that also receives support from the Migrant Resource Centre of Southern Tasmania. This program promotes understanding, inclusiveness and

community by bringing together 20 young people of vastly different backgrounds for a ten-day voyage aboard the STV Windeward Bound and giving them the opportunity to connect and grow with one another in both the short and long term.

The Youth Leadership Challenge is open to youths between the ages of 15–18 living in Tasmania – ten locals with an interest in mentoring and creating a more inclusive Tasmanian community and ten from refugee backgrounds. This program is fortunate to receive generous financial support from a number of sponsors, which allows us to significantly



reduce the cost for all participants. Those who wish to participate as mentors are required to fundraise \$2,500 in donations to further offset these costs and youth from refugee backgrounds are eligible for a significant subsidy to cover the majority of their voyage fee. The Windeward Bound Trust provides some guidance to mentors in their fundraising and assists in matching mentors with Rotary clubs' sponsors. Nearly half of all Tasmanian Rotary clubs have sponsored mentors in past years and most mentors from previous voyages have received some Rotary sponsorship.
