OVERVIEW OF ROTARY YOUTH PROGRAMS

Rotary Youth Programs are provided by the 46 Rotary clubs across Tasmania, each with a mission to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

To make the application process as simple as possible, students can find information about all the Rotary Youth Programs available to them online. Program costs depend on a number of factors. However, we have a number of sponsorships and financial plans available to make sure a wide cross-section of students and their families can afford to participate. Not all programs require a long-term commitment – students can start with some of our small, short-term programs, then decide whether they want to commit to one of our larger, long-term programs.

ROTARY YOUTH PROGRAM OF ENRICHMENT (RYPEN)

This weekend camp is the perfect opportunity for Year 10 students who need a helping hand to develop their leadership, initiative and responsibility skills. The informal and fun setting makes it easy for participants to build new friendships and become more aware of their own talents and potential.

ROTARY YOUTH DRIVER AWARENESS PROGRAM (RYDA)

Aimed at Year 10 students, this one-day program combines driver safety with essential life skills. After completing this program, students will be better equipped for the challenges of driving solo or being an influential passenger of a novice driver. The greatest impact often comes from hearing personal stories of loss and survival from guest speakers.

WINDEWARD BOUND YOUTH LEADERSHIP CHALLENGE (WBYLC)

This ten day voyage is a joint initiative of the Windeward Bound Trust and Rotary, focused on building understanding, inclusiveness and community. Once applications have been received, ten Year 9-12 students with an interest in mentoring will be selected by the Challenge committee, along with ten young people nominated by the Migrant Resource Centre of Southern Tasmania.

NATIONAL YOUTH SCIENCE FORUM (NYSF)


More than 100 Year 11 students with an interest in science, engineering and technology learn what it's like to be a scientist at this 12-day Forum. Students live on campus at The Australian National University in Canberra, letting them experience university life first hand. This is an incredible opportunity to meet like-minded young people from around the country and get the edge in year 12 and beyond.

TASMANIAN YOUTH SCIENCE FORUM (TYSF)

Three days of STEM workshops for Year 11/12 students held during April at the UTAS Sandy Bay campus. Meet like-minded science nerds from around the state and experience a variety of science workshops with University researchers and students in everything from zoology to chemistry, marine and Antarctic studies to medical research.

SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CHALLENGE (SEC)

This one-day challenge will help Year 10 students see that science can be fun, encouraging them to include science in their Year 11 and 12 subject choices, and possibly even consider a future career. The challenge gives students hands-on experience they would not usually have access to in their school environment, while also building teamwork and problem solving skills.



THE SCIENCE EXPERIENCE (TSE)

The ConocoPhillips Australia Science Experience is a national program that encourages Year 9 and 10 students to see science, engineering and technology as interesting and worthwhile subjects and career choices. The three day, hands-on sessions are held at the University of Tasmania's Hobart, Launceston and Cradle Coast campuses, connecting interested students with scientists who love their work.

MODEL UNITED NATIONS ASSEMBLY (MUNA)

Designed for Year 10 students, MUNA encourages young people to learn about other nations and to understand how the UN works, while also building their debating and public speaking skills. MUNA is an initiative of the UN, with events held around the world – a 'MUNA' google search is a great way to see what to expect and what's happening in other countries.

ROTARY ADVENTURE IN CITIZENSHIP (RAIC)

Rotary Adventure in Citizenship (RAIC) is an intensive and fun filled week-long program to help prepare young adults for full participation as citizens of Australia.

For a week, RAIC puts the delegates 'inside' Canberra. They view Parliament in action, including the budget speech and question time, meet their Federal member of parliament and press gallery journalists. Through role play, delegates participate in law-making debates and explore the functions of the Parliament. One of the highlights is having morning tea with the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE (RYE)

Up to 15 Tasmanian Year 10 and 11 students are selected to do a Rotary Youth Exchange each year. This program runs for up to 12 months, making it suitable for resilient students who are looking for a challenge away from their support networks. With a new culture, and often a new language, each exchange will have its ups and downs, but the rewards will be worth it.

CREATING MY CAREER (CMC)

This program delivers real world learning to students, who may not have a clear pathway in mind, as they transition through school. It aims to provide insight into what career, study and employment possibilities are available to them. This is done through practical hands on (as much as possible) activities. CMC provides students with a practical look into what a career in a chosen profession actually looks like across a range of careers.

Tasmanian Youth Science Forum


Year 11-12 students

Rotary Adventure in Citizenship

Year 11 students

Rotary Adventure in Citizenship (RAIC) is an intensive and fun-filled program to help prepare young adults for full participation as citizens of Australia.

Each year in May around 35 Year 11 students (the delegates) are sent by their local Rotary clubs to Canberra for a week. They are immersed behind the scenes in Parliament House, experience new places, meet new faces and do new things.

Delegates view parliament in action, including the budget speech and question time, meet their federal members of parliament and press gallery journalists. Through role play, they participate in law-making debates and explore the functions of the parliament. They have morning tea with the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Importantly, they meet and make friends with young people from all over Australia, a highlight of the RAIC program.

The program is run in partnership with the Parliamentary Education Office.

Creating My Career


